Thank you for your email of 4 September 2019 to the Minister of Housing requesting the following information under the Official Information Act 1982 (the OIA):

- the number of HomeStart Grant granted for the Wellington Region each year, by neighborhood and suburbs for the last 4 years. The information should be aggregated by amount granted (e.g. x HomeStart Grant between 3k and 4k, etc...)
- the number and amount of Welcome Home Loan granted for the Wellington Region each year, by neighborhood and suburbs for the last 4 years.

On 5 September 2019, the Minister's office transferred your request to Housing New Zealand to respond under section 14 of the OIA.

In response to your request Housing New Zealand does not capture data down to a "neighbourhood and Suburb" level. The smallest geographic area we capture data (in a sortable format) is by Territorial Local Authority (TLA) level. Both the Welcome Home Loan and HomeStart Grant data is at a TLA level.

The Wellington Region is considered to be as defined by the TLA as:

- Kapiti Coast
- Porirua City
- Upper Hutt
- Lower Hutt
- Wellington City

We have taken the request for data for the last four years to mean aggregated, rather than broken down by year. The number of HomeStart Grants paid for the period 1 July 2015 to 30 June 2019 for each TLA, is broken down by grant amount with the grant amounts shown as per household, rather than per applicant in the table below.
